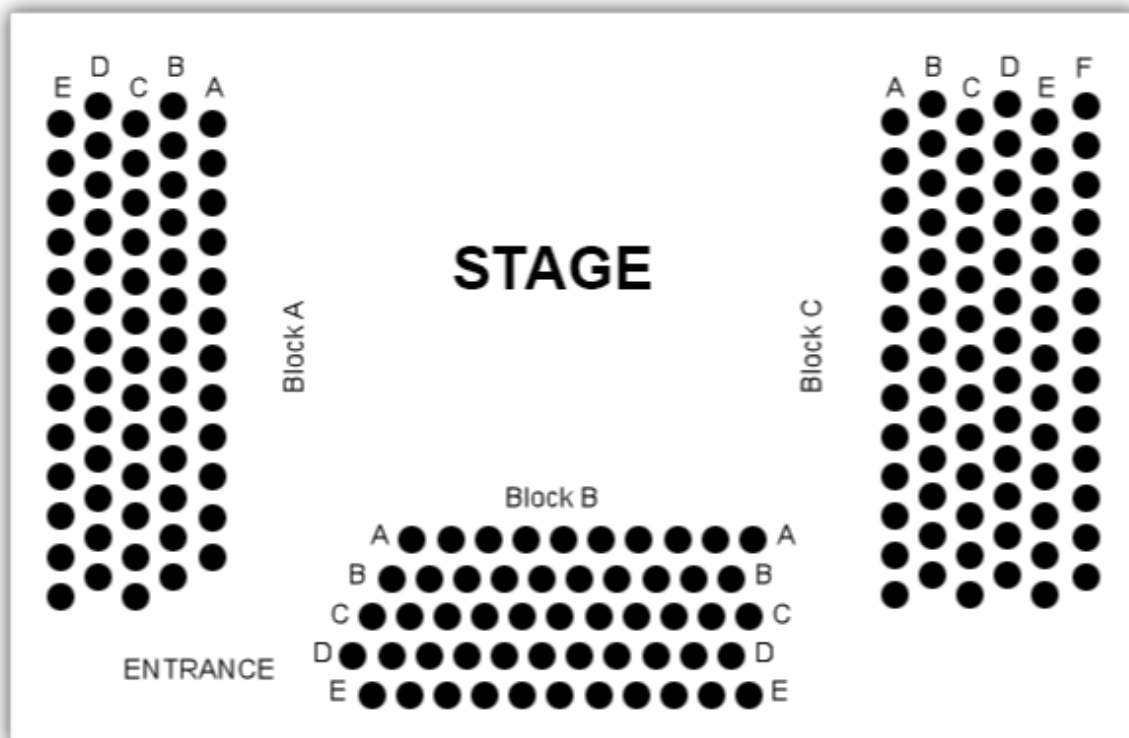

The Space:

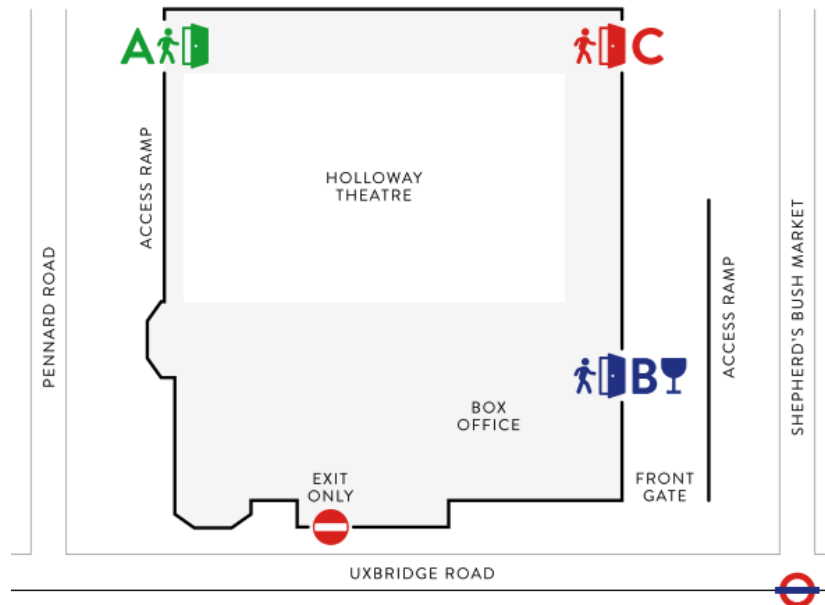
- This show will take place in the Holloway Theatre, which is the larger of our two performance spaces. For this performance, the space will be in a 'thrust' arrangement, meaning the seats are arranged on three sides of the stage (see below).
- The maximum capacity is 195. Access to the Holloway Theatre is on the ground floor and the floor is level.



- There is step free access to the front row in Blocks A, B and C.
- A wheelchair space is available to book for every show.
- Please note that due to the intimate nature of the performance space latecomers may not be admitted, and there may be no readmission once the performance has begun.
- **As the show is in development, more information will be available closer to the time of performance.**

Access Information:

- There are three entrances to the Holloway Theatre - please check your assigned entrance on your e-ticket.



- Entrance A is to the right of the building, on Pennard Road. This entrance is accessible via a ramp suitable for wheelchair users and buggies. There is a black door leading directly to the Holloway Theatre.
- Entrance B is accessible via a ramp suitable for wheelchair users and buggies to the right of the building, or via three steps. There is an automatic double glass door. From here the Box Office is to the left and the Library Café and Bar and Gianni and Michael Alen-Buckley Script Library are beyond the Box Office around the corner. Entrance B is the main doorway marked Holloway Theatre, just beyond the bar and to the right of the Script Library.
- Entrance C is accessible via the same ramp or steps. There is an automatic double glass door. The entrance is immediately to the right, through the door marked Studio.
- The main entrance on Uxbridge Road at the front of the building through the porch up some steps is being mostly used as an exit at present. If you do enter this way, the theatre's Library Café and Bar is straight ahead, the Gianni and Michael Alen-Buckley Script Library is to the left, and the Box Office to the right.
- Access to the Holloway Theatre is on the ground floor and the floor is level.
- The toilets are situated on the first floor and are accessible via stairs or the lift.

- There is also an accessible toilet on the ground floor beneath the stairs which access patrons have priority to use.
- There is step free access to the front row in Blocks A, B and C.
- The Bush Theatre aims to be as accessible as possible in everything we do. The whole building is fully accessible for wheelchair users, a hearing loop is available, and Assistance Dogs are welcome at every performance. Complimentary tickets for essential companions are also available.

About the show:

- *The P Word* is about two gay Pakistani men – Billy (Bilal) and Zafar. Billy is from the UK and Zafar is from Pakistan but has had to leave and seek asylum in the UK because his partner Haroon has been murdered by his family.
- Billy and Zafar meet during Pride in London and form an uncertain friendship until Zafar is detained as the UK government plans to deport him back to Pakistan where he could be killed for being gay.
- The play looks at what it's like to grow up as a first generation immigrant and how that can affect your sense of self.
- It explores what it's like to be gay in a culture that either dismisses your sexuality or disowns you, and how two people with the same marginalised identity do not have the same homogenous experience.
- This play handles themes of internalised racism and homophobia.

- Themes of and references to violence, including a homophobic murder
- Sexual references and descriptions of sex
- Infrequent references to alcohol consumption
- Infrequent references to and description of suicide ideation
- Themes of homophobia and internalised homophobia
- Continued themes and description of racism, including the use of slurs
- Intermittent themes of body dysmorphia, references to fatphobia and themes of disordered eating
- References to mental illness
- Infrequent references to physical injury
- Discussion of grief
